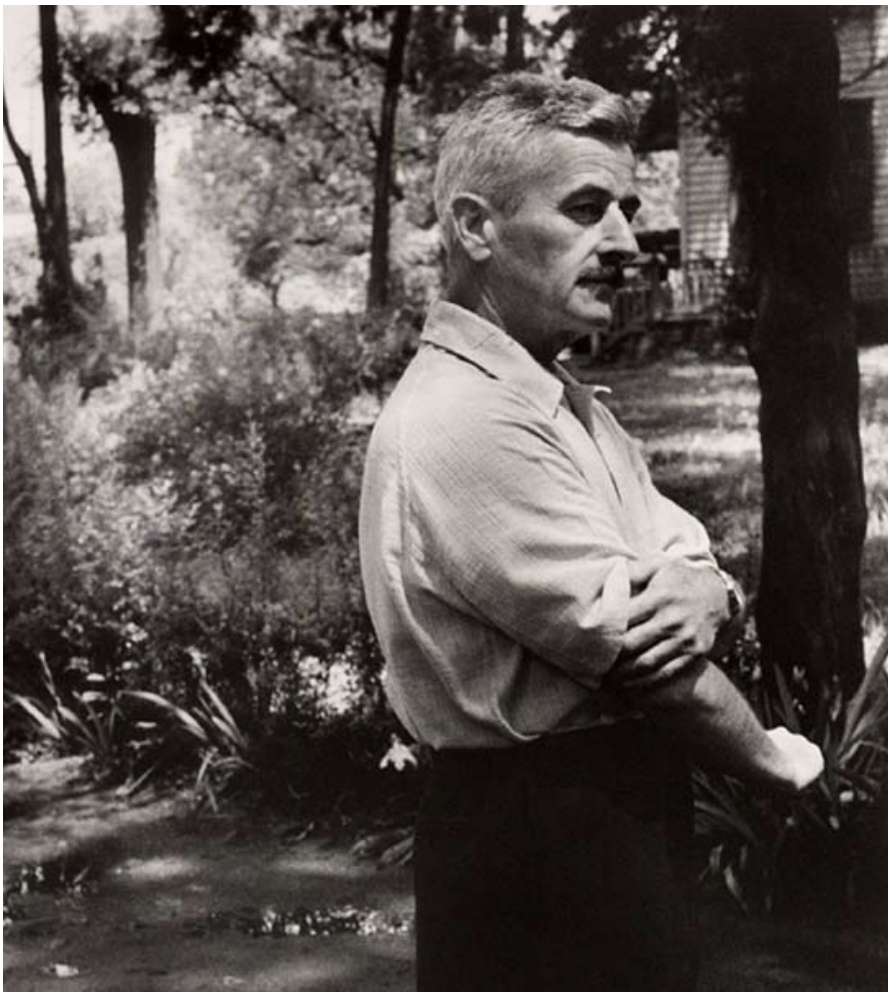
## Life Should be Danced

### Thomas Jefferson Part II

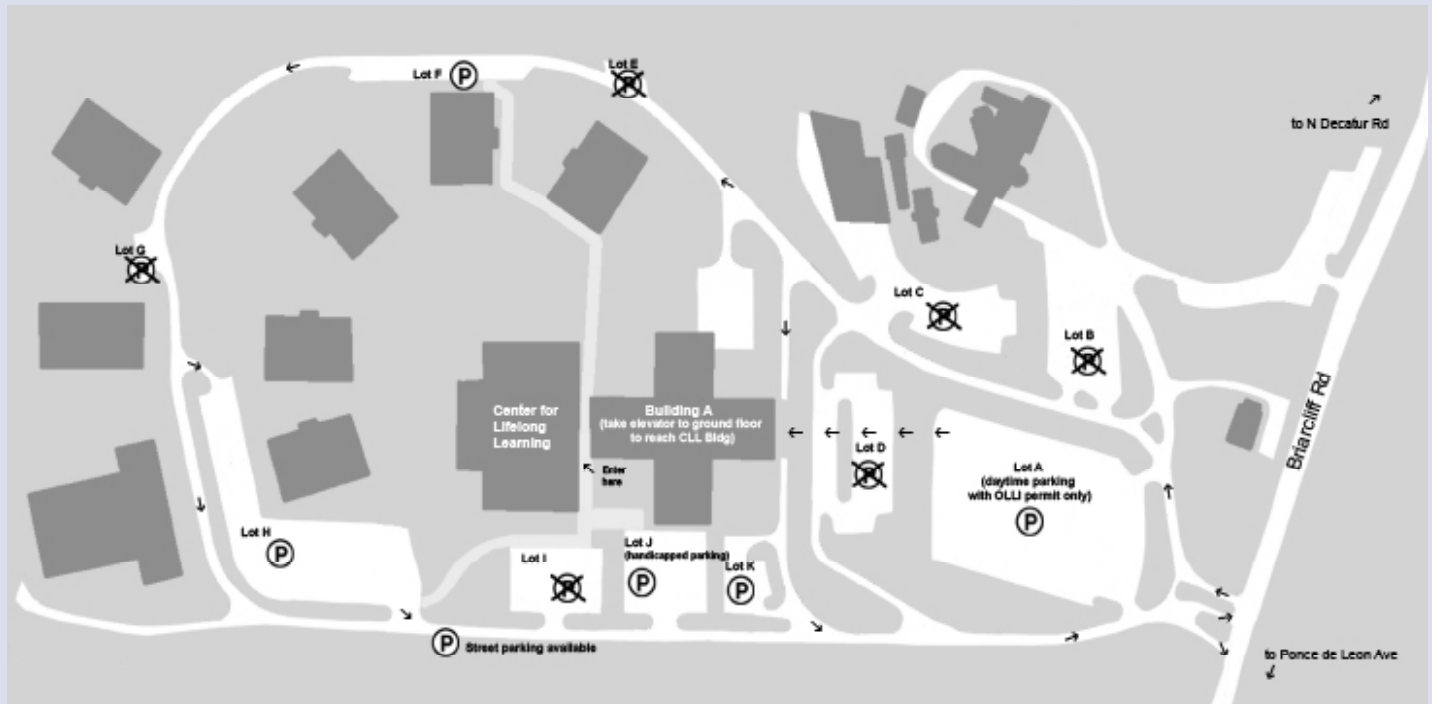
